

Park amenities and facilities

In addition to overnight accommodations, the park provides lawns and shade trees in the midst of an arid environment. River rock lines trails. Children's play equipment adds fun to the park. Beavers are visible on the Columbia River. Other amenities and facilities include:

- Year-round boat launch with two boat ramps
- 320 feet of day-use dock space
- 80 picnic sites, including one site accessible to people with disabilities
- Two reservable picnic shelters
- Two tennis courts
- One multi-use court for paddle ball, handball and Pickleball
- Horseshoe pits
- Two sand volleyball courts, one grass court
- Swim beach
- One multi-purpose field with baseball backstop and soccer goals
- Full basketball court
- 1.3 miles of paved trail
- Five modern restrooms, four with showers (one restroom and three showers are accessible to people with disabilities) and 2 family style ADA restrooms with showers
- Trailer dump station
- Playground equipment
- Amphitheater
- Access to the paved, 5-mile long, Rocky Reach Trail that is a cycling/walking trail along the Columbia River and connects to the Apple Capital Loop Trail in East Wenatchee

The Discover Pass is required for day visits to state parks and access to other state-managed recreation lands. The pass provides access to millions of acres of parks, wildlife areas, trails, natural areas and water-access sites. The annual pass is transferable between two vehicles.

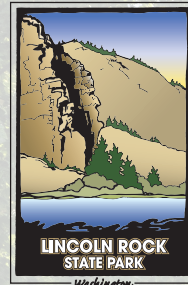
- Annual pass: \$30

Things to remember

- **Park hours** – March 1 to Oct. 31st, 6:30 a.m. to dusk.
- **Winter schedule** – For a winter schedule and information about seasonal closures, visit www.parks.wa.gov or call the information center at (360) 902-8844. Watercraft launch is open during the winter, but is not maintained or plowed.
- Wildlife, plants and all park buildings, signs, tables and other structures are protected; removal or damage of any kind is prohibited. Hunting, feeding of wildlife and gathering firewood on state park property is prohibited.
- Maximum of eight people per campsite.
- Campsites may not be held for other parties.
- Camping check-in time is 2:30 p.m., and check-out time is 1 p.m. Cabin check-in time is 4:00 p.m. and check-out time is 11 a.m.
- Extra vehicle overnight - \$10 per night in designated area for each vehicle in excess of the one allowed per site. Does not apply to vehicle towed by a recreational vehicle.
- Pets must be on leash and under physical control at all times. This includes trail areas and campsites. Pet owners must clean up after pets on all state park lands.
- Quiet hours are 10 p.m. to 6:30 a.m.
- Engine-driven electric generators may be operated only between the hours of 8 a.m. and 9 p.m.

Welcome to Lincoln Rock State Park

Lincoln Rock State Park is an 86-acre camping park with 2,300 feet of freshwater shoreline, on the east side of 31-mile-long Lake Entiat, a reservoir created by Rocky Reach Dam blocking the flow of the

Overnight accommodations

The park has 27 standard campsites, 35 partial-hookup sites and 32 full-hookup sites. Maximum site length is 65 feet (may have limited availability). All lawn areas, including the tent area, are irrigated daily. To reserve a campsite, call (888) CAMPOUT or (888) 226-7688, or visit online at www.parks.state.wa.us.

Those who want a little comfort with their camping can reserve one of four primitive cabins that overlook Lake Entiat. If you want even more comfort you can reserve one of eight deluxe cabins that have the amenities of the primitive cabins plus a kitchenette (microwave, sink, mini-fridge), larger dining table, and a restroom with shower. They sleep 5-6 guests on a queen futon and a twin bunk bed.

Cabins are reservable from March 15 through Oct. 15. To reserve a cabin call (888) CAMPOUT or (888) 226-7688.

A group camp accommodates up to 50 people. The camp includes a picnic shelter, large group fire pit with benches, multiple BBQs, one full-utility trailer site, two partial utility trailer sites, and a bathroom/shower facility with a shared area in addition to two private family-style restrooms with showers.

Columbia River north of Wenatchee.

The park has expansive green lawns that span the shores of the lake, a popular place for swimming, water skiing and respite from the hot sun.

Lincoln Rock has 340 feet of reservable boat moorage space. This space is located on five docks. Moorage space can be reserved from May 15 through Sept. 15 and is available on a first-come, first-served basis the remainder of the season. Reservations can be made by calling (888) CAMPOUT or (888) 226-7688.

Park history

Lincoln Rock State Park is named for a prominent rock formation visible across the Columbia River that resembles the profile of President Abraham Lincoln. The formation, which is carved into a cliff at the mouth of Swakane Canyon, was long-recognized by Native Americans and Euro-American settlers as resembling a human face.

In 1898, Charles H. Schoff took a photo of the rock from the deck of the Echo, a Columbia River packet steamboat that ran between Wenatchee and Orondo, where he served as an engineer. Ed Ferguson, a deckhand on the boat, was reading a biography of Abraham Lincoln and remarked that the face in the rock resembled the late president. Over time, the feature became known to crew members and passengers as Lincoln Rock.

In the July 1902 issue of The Ladies Home Journal, a photograph of Lincoln Rock taken by M. P. Spencer was published as part of an array titled "Rocks That Have Faces on Them." This led to the feature's national recognition.

In 1945, a proposal was made for the state to acquire the land encompassing Lincoln Rock as a park. Ultimately, the plan was dropped due to the cost of acquiring the land. In 1981, the Chelan County Public Utility District developed the present-day park across the water from Lincoln Rock to be managed by the Washington State Parks and Recreation Commission. Originally planned to be called Eastgate, the park's name was changed to Lincoln Rock at the request of locals.
