**Priority 2:** Expand existing parks, trails and services

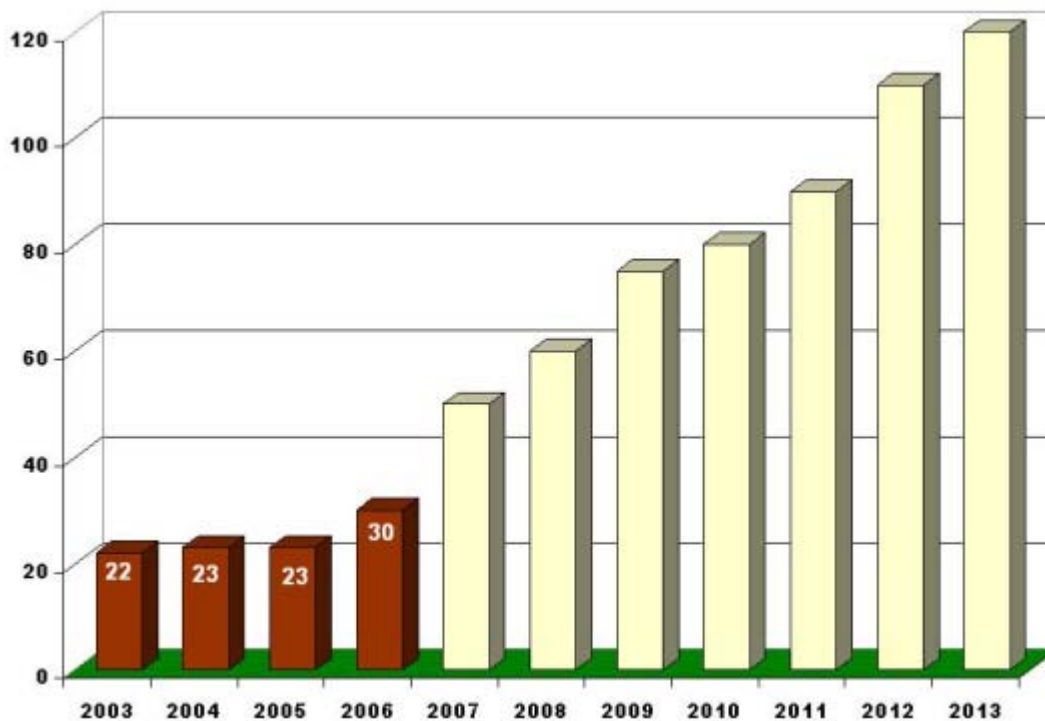
**Priority 3:** Build new parks and trails for the future

So citizens can understand and support the care of their parks and environment

Total as of Dec. 31, 2006: 30 parks have completed land-use plans



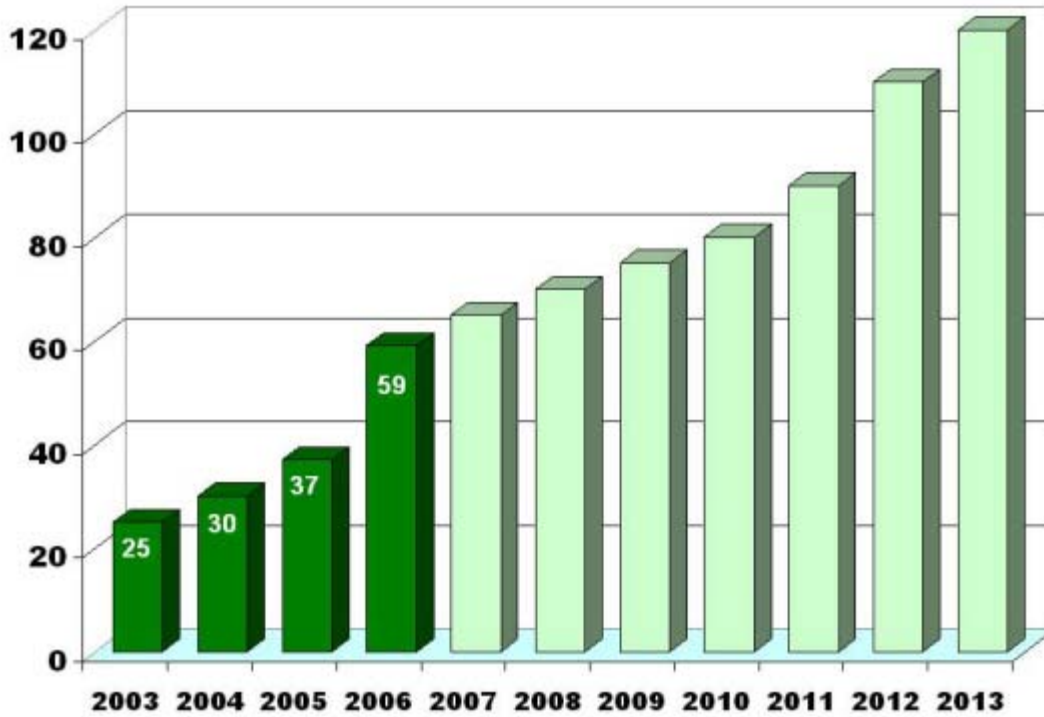
A public meeting sets the stage for planning at Lake Sammamish State Park.

### **Our Commitment - Enjoyment, Health and Learning**

So citizens can connect with Washington's heritage and pursue personal health

**Goal:** 120 state parks have community events and interpretive programs

Total as of Dec. 31, 2006: 59 parks offer community events and interpretive programs

Our Commitment - Public service

So citizens are confident their taxes are used wisely

**Goal:** Agency rates at least "B+" on surveys

Our Commitment - Facilities

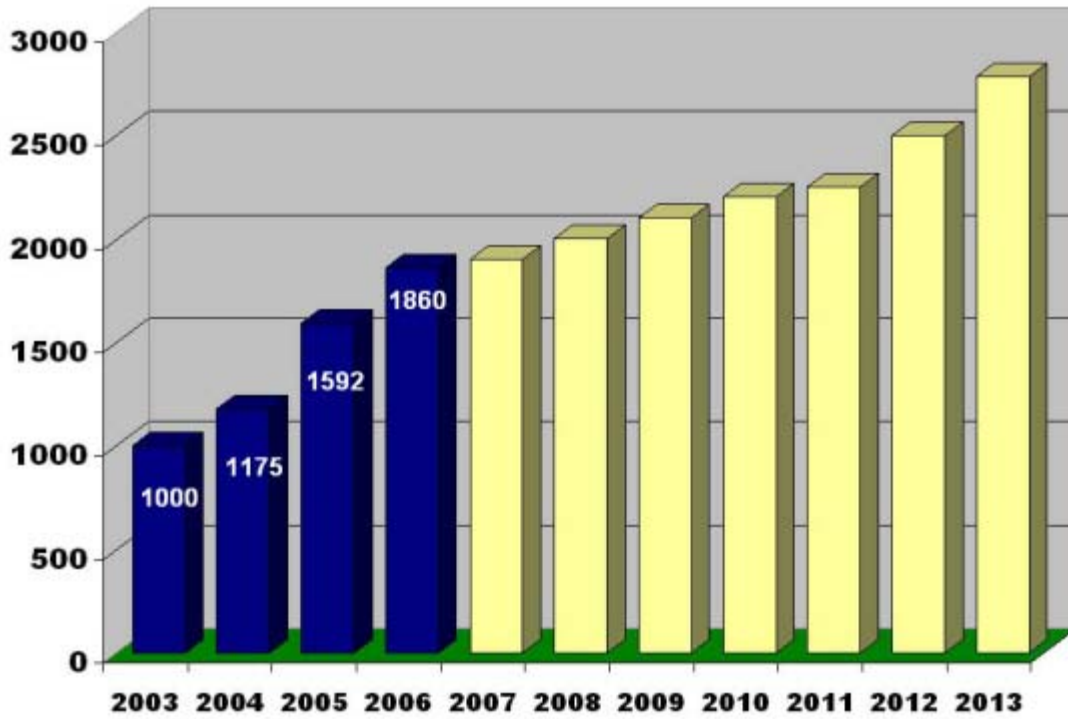
So citizens have safe and modern parks

**Deferred maintenance**

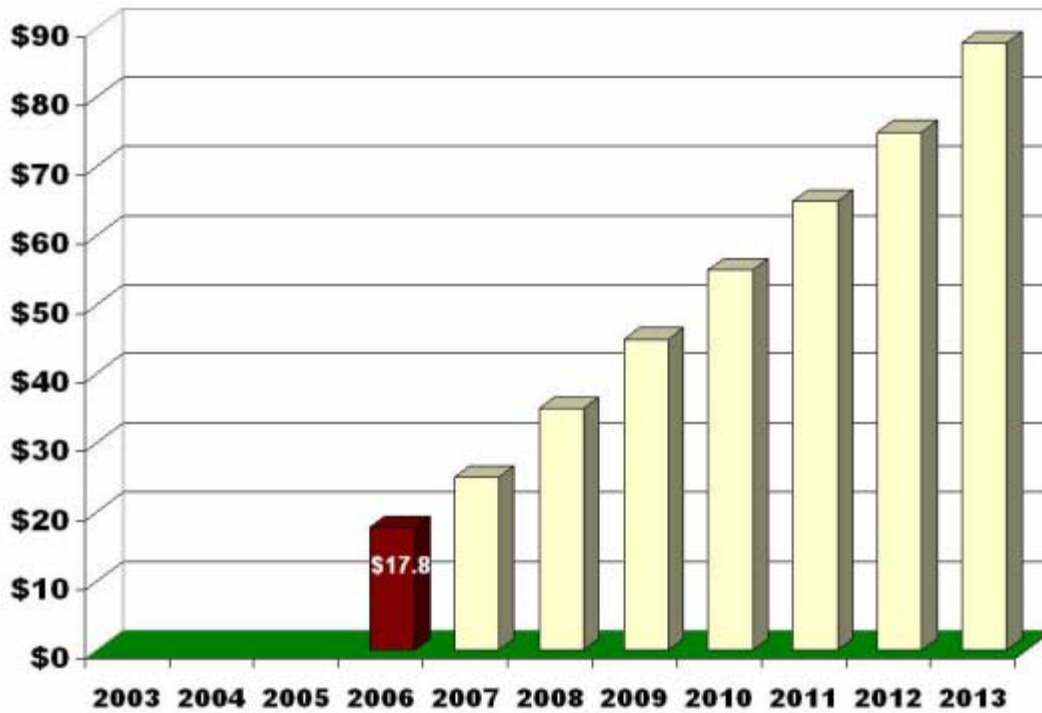
**Goal:** 2,782 projects, \$40 million

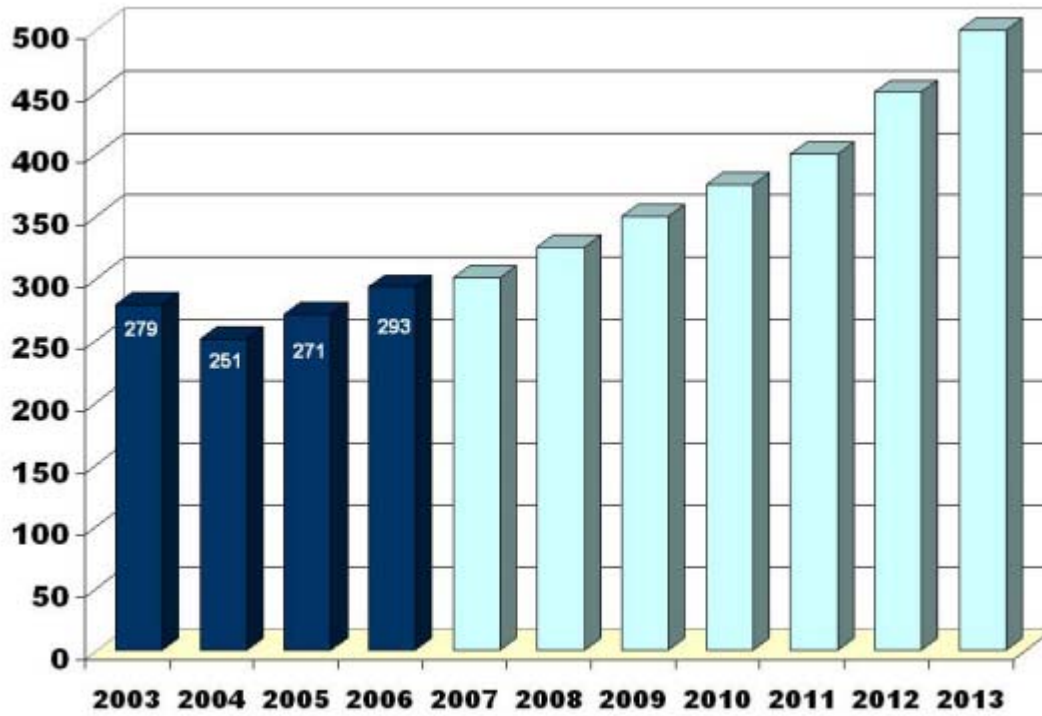
Our Commitment - Partnerships

**Goal:** 500,000 annual volunteer hours

(in thousands)



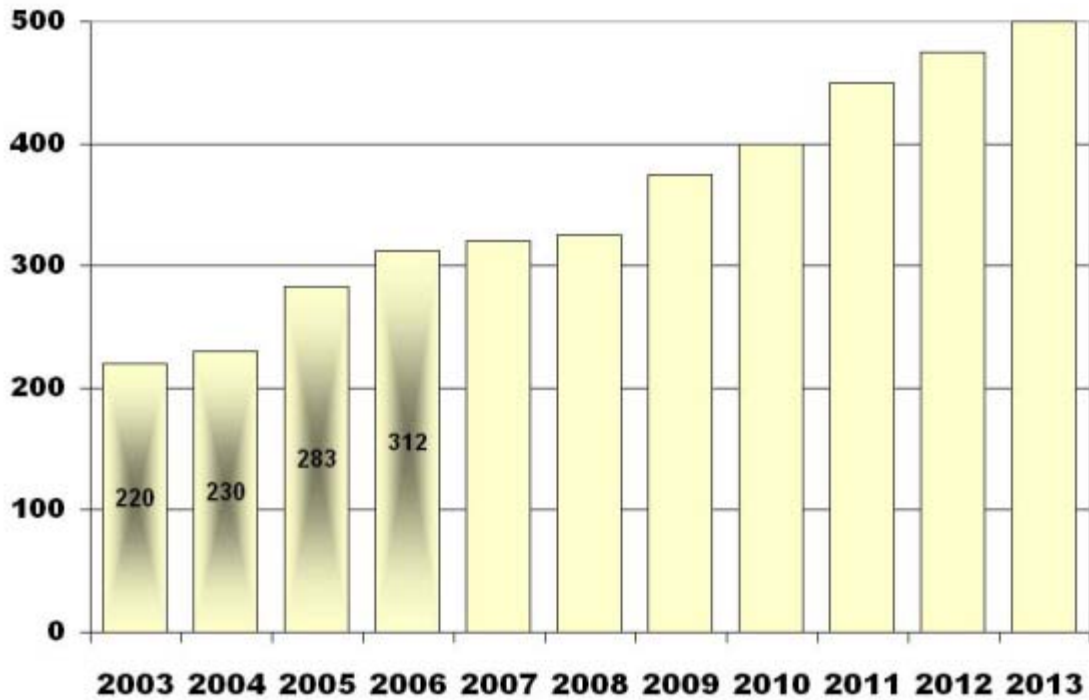

**Goal:** Double partnerships to 500

Total as of Dec. 31, 2006: 312 partnerships



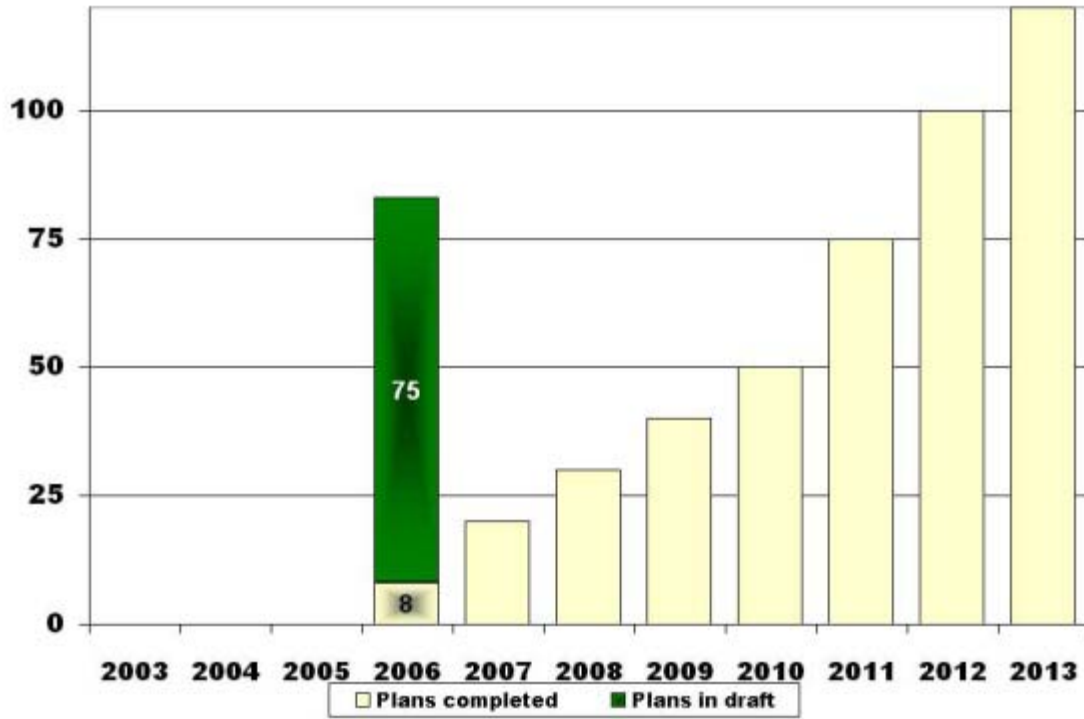
Volunteer and partner groups work together at annual Coastal Cleanup.

## Our Commitment - Financial strategy

So citizens know that innovation and accountability will sustain their parks

**Goal:** 120 state parks have business plans that include cost savings and four revenue sources (taxes, facility fees, product and service revenues and donations).

Total as of Dec. 31, 2006: 8 business plans completed; another 75 in draft.

Your Legacy - Trails



So citizens prepare parks for a growing state - trails

**Goal:** 1,000 new miles of trail for public use

Total as of Dec. 31, 2006: 704.5 new trail miles added

- Klickitat Trail - 31 miles opened in 2003
- Lower Columbia water trail - 146 miles opened in 2004
- Northwest Discovery water trail - 367 miles opened in 2005
- Winter recreation trails, statewide - 57.5 miles opened in 2005; John Wayne Pioneer Trail East, 103 miles added through DNR transfer, 2006.

Your Legacy - Expand existing parks, build new parks

So citizens prepare parks for a growing state

**Goal:** Open three new parks, expand 10 parks

The Centennial Plan identifies 10 existing parks for expansion by 2013 and three new parks to be developed to meet future demands.

- Identify parks

## State parks identified for expansion

- Beacon Rock: Camping, day use, roadway and trail improvements
- Belfair: Park-wide renovation in cooperation with Hood Canal Salmon Enhancement Group
- Cape Disappointment: Complete Commission-approved master plan
- Deception Pass: Redevelop Sunrise area, master plan improvements
- Fort Worden: Convert barracks to motel-style accommodations, historic structure renovations
- John Wayne Pioneer Trail (West): Improve trail surface, tunnels and trestles to allow for multi-use
- Lake Sammamish: Implement Commission-approved master plan
- Millersylvania: Renovate Civilian Conservation Corps-era buildings, new environmental learning center, campground upgrades
- Pearygin Lake: Park redevelopment, expansion, new trails, cabins
- Riverside: New campground, convert existing campground to day use

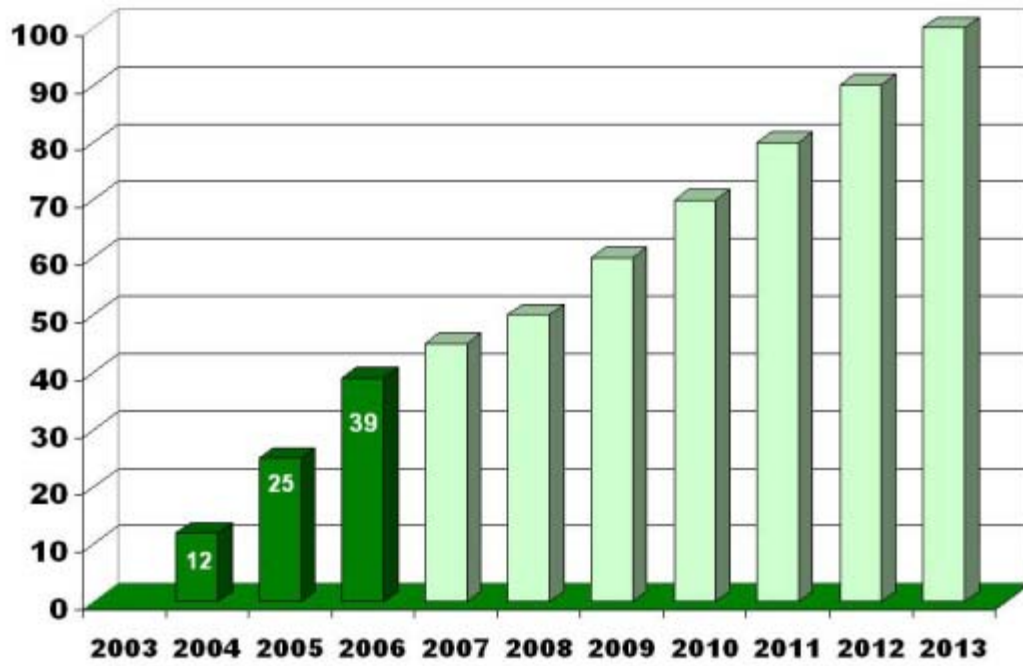
