Things to remember

- Facilities are available uear round.
- · Check-in time is 2:30 p.m.
- Check-out time is 11:00 a.m.
- There is a charge for early check-in or late check-out.
- Tent or RV camping is prohibited in the retreat center area. Fort Flagler State Park has 116 campsites available in two campgrounds, approximately 1.75 miles from the retreat center. Call (888) CAMPOUT to make a reservation.
- · Each group must identify a group camp director who will be responsible for activities.
- Camps cannot serve more than their capacity.

The Discover Pass is required for day visits to state parks and access to other state-managed recreation lands. The pass provides access to millions of acres of parks, wildlife areas, trails, natural areas and water-access sites. The annual pass is transferable between two vehicles.

• Annual pass: \$30 • One-day pass: \$10 (transaction and dealer fees may apply)



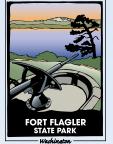

Fort Flagler

Historical State Park Retreat Center



Fort Flagler Historical State Park on the tip of Marrowstone Island was a significant coastal defense fort built in the late 1890s to defend the entrance to **Puget Sound. The fort was** manned during World War I, World War II and the Korean War. Fort Flagler is a popular park for fishing, crabbing, clamming and seaweed harvesting during their respective seasons. Visitors also come for biking, hiking, kite-flying and paragliding. Fort Flagler features 2 miles of beach trail and 4 miles of wooded trails. The park also has a museum and gift shop and offers tours of the historic gun emplacements and historic hospital in high season. The onsite barracks-style camps, Hoskins, Richmond and Wilson are available for retreats of up to 274 people. **Fort Flagler** also offers five historic vacation house rentals.

Camp Hoskins

Camp Hoskins was originally constructed to house enlisted men during World War II. Today the combination of three dormitories, a large commercial kitchen and dining facility make up the largest camp at the Fort Flagler State Park Retreat Center. The camp accommodates up to 185 guests in three two-story dormitories and the Infirmary/Cook's Quarters. Each building has a restroom with showers on each floor. There is an additional restroom that accommodates people with disabilities on the first floor of dorm #107.

The camp sits on the north end of the historic parade ground, which can be used for activities from marching band performances to group games. A large campfire ring is available for guests.

Camp Richmond

Camp Richmond, the Bachelor Officer's Quarters during World War II, provides accommodations for up to 52 guests.

This two-story, dormitory
style building is
self-contained
and features
main floor
housing,

spacious commercial kitchen, dining room area, multi-purpose room and two restrooms with showers. When available, a second dormitory (building 109) can be reserved along with Camp Richmond to increase the capacity to 112 guests.

Situated on the bluff overlooking
Admiralty Inlet, Camp Richmond offers
spectacular views of the Cascades,
Mount Baker and Puget Sound.
The camp includes a campfire
ring, and is within walking
distance to the beach.

Camp Wilson

Camp Wilson, the smallest of the three camps, is an ideal place for smaller groups and more intimate gatherings. Camp Wilson consists of three buildings that can accommodate up to 37 guests. The main building contains a small commercial kitchen, sleeping quarters for up to 22 people, restrooms with showers and a separate recreation hall, furnished with tables and chairs. There is a second building that sleeps up to 15 people, and has a restroom and shower. The camp has a campfire ring and a large adjacent field for games.

Historic theater

The Historic Theater is a multi-use facility with a large stage at the rear of the building. The theater seats up to 200 people. Groups with existing reservations for a retreat center facility have preference when reserving this building.

Recreation hall

The Recreation Hall is a popular spot for weddings, reunions, banquets, meetings, receptions and workshops for up to 50 people. The facility includes a small kitchen and restroom facilities.

Retreat center use

All kitchens are fully equipped with cooking and eating utensils, basic cleaning supplies, toilet paper and paper towels. Guests should take along their own towels, sheets, blankets and pillows.
